Soloist Mariko Moffat

Mariko Moffat is 16 years old and is a student at Penrith's Queen Elizabeth Grammar School.

Mariko began learning the piano from Mrs Jo Matthews at the age of 3 and, 2 years later, she entered the '8 years and under' piano class in Carlisle Music Festival and won. Later she studied with Mrs Lorraine Gash, Mrs Helen Pendrous and a Polish pianist, Miss Alicja Fiderkiewicz.

Since her first victory in Carlisle Music Festival, she has carried off trophies in most of the piano classes, including the John Abba trophy for the highest mark in any piano class, which was awarded to her when she was 12. In the same year she won both junior (under 15 years) and senior (under 19 years) sections at the Lanercost Music Festival and for each of the following 2 years, she was awarded Young Musician of the Year at the Festival.



In 2010, she won First Prize in the senior section at the 'Lancaster and The Lakes Piano Competition' and the following year she was awarded the Martyn Tonge Roseball, which is awarded to a promising piano competitor in all piano classes at South Cumbria Musical Festival. Mariko passed Grade 8 piano exam with distinction when she was 13. She currently studies with Mr Martin Roscoe, and is working towards the Diploma exams. For the last three years she has enjoyed playing at masterclasses for Anthony Hewitt, Murray McLachlan, John Thwaites.

She also plays the violin and is a member of QEGS school orchestra. She has recently achieved Grade 8 violin and is also working towards the violin Diploma with Mrs Lena Nicholson. Mariko is looking forward to the coming academic year where she will be attending QEGS sixth form to study Mathematics, Chemistry, Biology and Geography.

The piano Mariko will be performing on is a 1930s Steinway and has recently been refurbished in Poland. We are grateful to North Cumbria Recitals for the use of their grand piano. (North Cumbria Recitals puts on 6 live concerts here in St Cuthbert's Church on Thursday evenings over the autumn and winter.)

About Tonight's Music

Giuseppe Verdi 1813 - 1901

Overture: La Forza del Destino

La Forza del Destino (The Force of Destiny) is an opera based on a Spanish drama, Don Álvaro o la fuerza del sino (1835), by Ángel de Saavedra, Duke of Rivas, with a scene adapted from Friedrich Schiller's Wallensteins Lager. It was first performed in the Bolshoi Kamenny Theatre of St. Petersburg, Russia, in 1862.

Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart 1756 - 1793

Piano Concerto No. 17 in G major, KV. 485

According to the date that the composer himself noted on the score, the concerto was completed on April 12, 1784. The concerto is scored for flute, 2 oboes, 2 bassoons, 2 horns and strings, the wind being particulary prominent, often in conversation with the solo piano. It could well be called a concerto for piano and wind, with string accompaniment.

Antonin Dvořák 1841 - 1904

Symphony No. 9 in E minor, Op. 95, 'From the New World'

In 1892 Dvořák took up an invitation to become director of the National Conservatory of Music of America, New York, and professor of composition. In spite of his administrative and teaching duties he still managed to compose his 9th Symphony in 1893.

Many of the themes resemble negro spirituals, for example the 2nd theme in the 1st movement is very like 'Swing Low Sweet Chariot', but the symphony has a undeniable Czech flavour. Durng his stay in New York Dvořák pined for his native Bohemia and spent summers with the Czech community in Spillville, Iowa. He returned to Prague in 1895.

As in much of Dvořák's music the themes are repeated throughout the movements and the symphony draws to a magnificent conclusion when themes from all 4 movements are quoted.
